25 April 1923 Fire At Mount Morgan. Block Of Twelve Buildings Destroyed In Main Street.

Frontage of 155 Yards Swept Away.

Our Mount Morgan correspondent telephoned Inst night as follows:

A serious outbreak of fire occurred in Morgan-street at twenty minutes past eleven o'clock to-night. The fire, which originated in the business premises of Mr. Farris, photographer, adjoining the Imperial Hotel, quickly spread along the street. The Imperial Hotel, the School of Arts, and the premises of Messrs. E. J Chick (tobacconist), J. Howard (fruiterer), and R. Scott (tobacconist), together with two vacant shops, are all blazing freely, and there seems to be very little chance of preventing the blaze from spreading further down the street. The main street in Mount Morgan, from the shop adjoining the School of Arts to the shop adjoining the Calliungal Shire Council's office, embracing twelve buildings, which include the School of Arts and the Imperial Hotel, were totally destroyed by fire to-night. The loss will represent many thou-sands of pounds, but at this hour it is quite impossible to form any accurate idea of the extent of the damage, nor, of course, is it possible to get any information regarding the fire insurances.

About twenty minutes past eleven o'clock Constable P. Donovan, who was on duty in Morgan-street in front of the School of Arts, smelt something smoldering, just as if rag were burning. He at once went to the back of the School of Arts and found that a feed room at the rear of the shop next to the School of Arts, occupied by the local office of the Rockhampton Co-operative butter Company was on fire.

Almost immediately the flames burst into the back of the shop occupied by Mr. M. Farris, photographer. In an incredibly brief period the place was an inferno, in twenty-five minutes the School of Arts and the two shops in question were a mass of flames, and within another fifteen minutes the huge two-storied wooden building that was the School of Arts was a mass of burning embers. The rapidity with which the fire consumed this building was almost incredible. A slight wind sprang up and drove the flames in the opposite direction. The Imperial Hotel billiard-room had now caught alight. Had the great efforts of Constable Blandford to secure sufficient fire extinguishers at this stage been successful, the Imperial Hotel might have been saved. This enormous two-storied wooden

hotel, which was erected many years ago, was soon alight from end to end. On the eastern side the flames soon licked up the shop occupied by Mr. E. J. Chick (tobacconist) and the Paramount Cafe (occupied by Messrs. Hall Brothers). Then followed Mr. J. Hoad's refreshment rooms. Then there was a slight lull owing to a brick wall. However, notwithstanding the valiant efforts of a huge body of willing workers, armed with buckets, the adjoining building, occupied by Mr. J. McKnight as an auction sale-room and not to be confounded with his office was destroyed, and it looked as if the Grand Hotel, which was the next building but one, would also go.

All the contents of the Grand Hotel were carried, or thrown out, and as the fire approached the next shop, occupied by Mr. R. Scott, tobacconist, part of the building was pulled down. This prevented the fire from extending to the Grand Hotel. The latter is a brick building, and all the woodwork facing the fire was torn down just as the flames licked up Mr. Scott's shop. The bucket brigade did good work here, and the Grand Hotel was saved.

Chicken Cordon Bleu. Prep: 15 min. Bake: 40 min. **Ingredients**

- 4 boneless skinless chicken breast halves
- 2 tablespoons butter, softened
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme
- 4 thin slices fully cooked ham
- 4 thin slices Swiss cheese
- 8 bacon strips
- 2 large eggs
- 1/2 cup 2% milk
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup dry bread crumbs
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/4 cup shredded Parmesan cheese

Directions

Preheat oven to 350°. Flatten chicken breasts to 1/8-in. thickness; spread butter on the insides. Sprinkle with thyme. Top with a slice of ham and cheese; roll up tightly. Wrap each with 2 slices of bacon and secure with toothpicks.

In a small bowl, beat eggs and milk. Place flour in another bowl. Combine the bread crumbs, garlic powder, oregano and cheese. Dip each chicken breast into egg mixture; dip into flour to coat. Dip each again into egg mixture, then coat with crumbs.

Place on a greased <u>baking sheet</u>. Bake, uncovered for 40-45 minutes or until chicken juices run clear.
